From the Vicar's Desk:

July and summer has started off with heat we normally see in fireworks on the Fourth of July. Please take good care of yourselves and stay hydrated in July's 100+ degree days! We're now in the longest season of the Church Year, The

Time After Pentecost, where the church is decorated in green until November 23rd when we begin Advent.

Like my sermons, I can't resist "chasing a rabbit." Here's a short one. In the Roman calendar, this month used to be called "Quintillus" because it was the fifth month of the year. It was changed to "July" in honor of the Roman Emperor, Julius Caesar. When the world adopted the Gregorian calendar, July got bumped to the seventh month.

Okay, here's another "rabbit." On July 3rd the church remembers St. Thomas. Although referred to as "Doubting Thomas" - Christian historians document Thomas the Apostle was responsible for taking the gospel to some of the darkest spiritual corners of the world. He traveled east, preaching in Persia and even traveled as far as India, where he reportedly built a church with his own hands. It is India's oldest church and it is also claimed to be the world's oldest existing church structure. Built by Thomas the Apostle in 57 AD, it's called Thomaiyar Kovil, and is located in Southern India. Although enhanced by Portuguese missionaries in the 17th century, the original building is still standing to this day!

Of course, Americans can't possibly forget the Fourth of July, when we celebrate Independence Day! For many Americans, it's a day to watch fireworks, barbeque and have a good time with friends and family. There is nothing wrong with having these traditions to celebrate our independence as a sovereign nation! It is equally as important to remember what our duties are as Christians.

American liberty is a blessing from God. Because of our freedom of religion, we can express our faith and boldly share it with others. After all, a key part of the ELCA in our name is " After all, a key part of the ELCA in our name is "Evangelical" where sharing is caring! No Bake Chocolate Oat Bars

1 C. Butter

1/2 C. packed Brown Sugar

1 Tsp. Vanilla

3 C. quick cooking oats

1 C. semi-sweet chocolate chips

1/2 C. Peanut Butter

Grease 9 X 9 pan

Melt butter, stir in brown sugar & vanilla. Mix in oats & cook over low heat 2-3 minutes or till well blended.

Press 1/2 mixture in pan.

Melt chocolate chips & peanut butter, stir until smooth. Pour over crust in pan, smooth out with back of spoon. Crumble remaining oat mixture over top, press gently.

Cover and refrigerate 2-3 hours. Cut in small squares.

Independence Day, also called **Fourth of July** or **July 4th**, in the <u>United States</u>, the annual celebration of nationhood. It <u>commemorates</u> the passage of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u> by the <u>Continental Congress</u> on July 4, 1776. Independence Day is celebrated on Monday, July 4, 2022 in the United States. <u>Fireworks</u> have been part and parcel of U.S. <u>Independence Day</u>, the anniversary of the signing of the <u>Declaration of Independence</u>, since its first celebration in July 1777. That celebration took place in the midst of the <u>Revolutionary War</u>, however, and explosions, artillery fire, and "bombs bursting in air" were not exactly a cause for joy and celebration at the time. So why did Americans begin celebrating Independence Day with fireworks?

To answer this question, a lot of people point to <u>John Adams</u>'s letter to his wife, <u>Abigail</u>, informing her that the <u>Continental Congress</u> had declared independence: "[This day] ought to be solemnized with Pomp and Parade, with Shews, Games, Sports, Guns, Bells, Bonfires and Illuminations from one End of this Continent to the other from this Time forward forever more."
