Cool Whip Candy

Ingredients:

2 bags Milk Chocolate Chips 8 oz. Tub Cool Whip 24 oz. Dark Chocolate Melting Wafers

Instructions:

1. In a microwave bowl, pour Milk Chocolate Chips, heat 1 minute on high. Remove from Microwave and stir. Return to microwave 1 minute more. Stir after each cycle until morsels are fully melted.

Line an 8 x 8 cake pan with parchment paper, be sure to make it large enough to go up all sides

- 2. In a larger bowl spoon the Cool Whip, then begin folding the melted Chocolate Chip morsels into the Cool Whip. The chocolate may harden into flakes, this is not a problem.
- 3. Once the chocolate has been folded into the Cool Whip, pour it in the prepared pan and put in freezer for 30 minutes. Remove from freezer cut in equal sized squares.
- 4. Melt the chocolate wafers in a microwave bowl, stirring after each cycle for as long as needed.

Using a fork or skewer, dip each piece of frozen candy into the melted chocolate and set on a parchment covered tray.

5. keep the candy in the freezer until ready to serve. It is best to be cold until serving. These can be turned into truffles by dropping small spoonsful onto a tray and freezing them.

Luke 23:33-43 Amid scoffing and slander from those who sarcastically call him Messiah and King. Jesus reveals that to be Messiah and King is to give one's life to others. Here he uses his power to welcome a despised criminal to paradise but puts his own death into God's hands.

NOVEMBER 27, 2022; First Sunday in Advent

Isaiah 2:1-5

Psalm 122

Romans 13:11-14

Matthew 24:26-44 Jesus describes his second coming as a sudden, turbulent event that will bring about deep change to our normal, day-to-day lives. Therefore, he urges people to stay awake, be aware, and wait expectantly, because the Son of Man will come unannounced.

First Sunday of Advent. The new church year begins with a wake-up call: Christ is coming soon! In today's readings both Paul and Jesus challenge us to wake from sleep, for we know neither the day nor the hour of the Lord's coming. Isaiah proclaims the day when God will gather all people on the holy mountain and there will be no more war or suffering. Though we vigilantly watch for the promised day of salvation, we wait for what we already have: Christ comes among us this day as the word and meal that strengthens our faith in the promise of God.

His musical perception has drawn critical acclaim. Awarded Best American Contemporary Performance at the Cincinnati World Piano Competition and Best Performance of the Commissioned Work at the Texas State International Piano Competition. He also enjoys broadening his passion



for contemporary music. Want to hear more? Dr. Cho is also a recording artist! One of his recent projects is his CD "Minimum | Maximum | Modern Piano Music by American Composers," released in March 2016 by Albany Records.

Dr. Cho has been a prizewinner in numerous competitions, including the International Piano Competition "Delia Steinberg" in Madrid, Spain, the Suri Music Concours, the JoongAng Music Concours in Korea, the Bradshaw & Buono International Piano Competition, the 5 Towns Music and Art Foundation Young Musician Competition in New York, New York International Music Concours, Glasgow International Competition for Young Pianists, The United States Virtuoso International Piano Competition, Texas State International Piano Competition, and the Cincinnati World Piano Competition.

Dr. Cho has appeared as a soloist throughout the world, including appearances with the Prime Philharmonic of Korea, the Festival Chamber Orchestra of Lublin Philharmonic, The Ashdod Symphony Orchestra, and The Round Rock Symphony. His performance highlights include solo recitals at the Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie

Hall, Yamaha Artist Services in Seoul, and the Kumho Art Hall, to name a few. He is also a pianist at the Lake George Music Festival, a strong supporter of contemporary classical music.

Dr. Cho started his musical studies when he was only four years old in Seoul, South Korea, and graduated from Yewon Arts Middle School, Seoul Arts High School, Seoul National University, and Manhattan School of Music. He earned a Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Dr. Cho has served as adjunct faculty of piano studies at New York University, a piano faculty at Kaufman Music Center, and a collaborative piano fellow and secondary piano instructor at Bard College-Conservatory of Music. He is currently a full-time collaborative pianist at Midwestern State University Lamar D. Fain College of Fine Arts. He has also taught and performed at the Texas State International Piano Festival, Minnesota International Piano Camp, Stokes Forest Music Camp, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp, and Bermuda Piano Festival.
